50 COLLEGES WITH THE BEST FINANCIAL AID

Many institutions offer financial aid packages that include scholarships, grants, work study programs, and other forms of assistance that do not need to be repaid; these allow students to receive an education without accruing large amounts of loan debt.

The current statistics related to student debt are troubling. <u>According to American Student Assistance (http://www.asa.org /policy/resources/stats/)</u>, roughly 20 million men and women attended college in the U.S. each year – and roughly 60% of these individuals (12 million) must borrow financial aid to cover tuition, residence fees, and other academic costs. There are currently 37 million Americans with outstanding college debt, more than half of which are younger than 39 years of age; the <u>Consumer Financial Protection Bureau estimates (http://www.consumerfinance.gov/blog/too-big-to-fail-student-debt-hits-a-trillion/)</u> that together these borrowers carry roughly \$1 trillion in outstanding student loan debt.

Fortunately, many higher-learning institutions offer financial aid packages that include scholarships, grants, work study programs, and other forms of assistance that do not need to be repaid; these packages allow students to receive an education and pursue a successful career without accruing large amounts of loan debt.

This list ranks the best U.S. colleges and universities in terms of financial aid packages that serve students whose family income falls below \$48,000 per year. Our goal with this list is to create a resource that financially-strapped students can use to determine which school will best provide the assistance they need in order to receive an advanced education.

RANKING METHODOLOGY

All 50 entries on this list are four-year public universities with enrollments that exceed 10,000 students. Furthermore, each school participates in the federal financial aid program known as Title IV. Federal financial aid under Title IV includes the following programs. Unlike student loans, none of these financial awards require repayment after the student has graduated.

- Pell Grant (https://studentaid.ed.gov/types/grants-scholarships/pell): A grant that provides tuition assistance to students who demonstrate financial need. The current maximum amount allowed by a Pell Grant is \$5,730 per year.
- TEACH Grant (http://studentaid.ed.gov/types/grants-scholarships/teach): A grant that provides up to \$4,000 per year for students earning a degree related to education. Recipients must commit to working in a "high-need field" or at a school that primarily serves low-income children and their families.
- Federal Work Study (FWS) (http://www2.ed.gov/programs/fws/index.html): These programs allow students to be employed in positions related to their academic major at a rate no lower than the state-mandated minimum wage.

These federal aid options will all be available at every school on our list for students who have completed and submitted a <u>Federal Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) (https://fafsa.ed.gov/)</u>, and meet the requisite criteria. In addition, numerous grant opportunities are available at the state-level. Typically, a student who attends any given university may be

We've included these two additional data points with each entry:

- Average Net Price (ANP): This figure represents the sum total of educational costs for students whose annual family income falls below \$48,000. ANP is calculated by subtracting the amount of money obtained through financial aid that does not need to be paid back (i.e., scholarships and grants) from the 'tuition sticker price'.
- **Overall Average Net Price:** Unlike the previous figure, this ANP applies to all students regardless of their family's household income. Since students with higher family income will not be eligible for certain forms of financial aid (such as federal Pell Grants), this amount will be higher than the ANP for students with a family income under \$48,000.

Both sets of data were obtained from the Integrated Postsecondary Education Data System (IPEDS), an online compendium managed by the National Center for Education Statistics (NCES).

HOW TO INTERPRET THE DATA

One noticeable aspect of this list is a lack of geographic diversity. Only 17 states are represented on our list, and 25 of the 50 colleges and universities listed below are located in one of three states: California, Texas, and New York. The City University of New York and California State University systems are particularly well-represented, with eight entries each. Additionally, the states of North Carolina, Louisiana, and Florida comprise another 12 entries. Students who attend college in these states have access to higher levels of state-sponsored grant programs, which can greatly reduce the overall cost of tuition.

It should also be noted that the colleges and universities are ranked in ascending order of the Average Net Price for students with family incomes below \$48,000. The order of our list was not influenced by the Overall Average Net Price. Additionally, student loans and other forms of financial aid that the recipient must pay back did not factor into the list (since the incurred debt would affect the net price of tuition).
